## Fire Victims Rebuild their Lives with Help of School Children

Victims in Northern California are still rebuilding their lives after valley fires claimed hundreds of homes in Lake County and Calaveras County last September. Thanks to many generous donors like the students at West Portal Lutheran School in San Francisco, victims have been receiving aid to help in the long-term recovery process.



West Portal Lutheran chooses a cause to donate their weekly chapel offerings to each quarter. After hearing about the fires that claimed the homes of hundreds of people in Northern California, staff at the school chose LSS to be a recipient of their collections. Kelly Still, Kindergarten teacher at West Portal Lutheran, discussed how excited the students were to donate to fire victims.

"The kids were super supportive. We described that the fires affected all kinds of people, families, young students like them, and that was very meaningful. I think it helped them have a sense

of purpose that they were helping those in need and were being servants, which is what we are trying to teach them. They were implementing the type of lifestyle that values being servants and sharing with others," she said.

Ms. Still described that in order to get the students engaged, they created a visual for the fire relief efforts. For every \$10 raised, the school removed one of the flames from under the water hose, symbolizing one home that had been saved from the fires. LSS is very grateful for the donations from West Portal Lutheran, and all of our other congregations and donors who have supported fire relief efforts.

The need for disaster support continues. Victims need your help NOW more than ever! All donations received for fire relief go directly towards rebuilding homes, lives, and addressing the destruction of property that resulted from the fires.

LSS assists those whose homes and livelihoods have been disrupted by disasters. We are present from the time of crisis throughout all stages of disaster recovery. It often takes months or years to rebuild and LSS is there for the long-term. We are part of the Lutheran Disaster Response network, and will respond as needed for relief efforts. ## F&M Bank Teaches Financial Literacy to LSS Clients

When LSS staff member Latoya Swinney met with a representative from F&M bank about the potential to host a financial literacy class series, she knew the young people she worked with would benefit tremendously.

Young people exiting California's foster care system are rarely exposed to financial literacy topics. In addition to a lack of adequate life skills around managing money, former foster youth often encounter challenges, with documented cases of both biological and foster families using their social security numbers to open credit cards, start mortgage applications, have utilities placed in their name and more.

F&M bank taught a much needed financial literacy series to young people from Stockton's Project Hope, and presented information about loans, how to start and maintain a savings account, how to start a retirement plan, how to build credit, and how to buy a home. Latoya spoke about the impact the classes had on the youth:

"The youth learned a lot about financial stability...they were able to get the inside information about how finances work, and have someone sit down and do a credit repair plan for them. One of the youth had a mortgage in their name, and others had credit cards in their names and never knew about it until their credit report was run."

After the success of the first series of classes, both our Walnut Manor and Saybrook locations in Sacramento followed suit. Michael Langlois, an intern for LSS in Sacramento, was in charge of coordinating the financial literacy classes at our Walnut Manor location. Walnut Manor provides housing to young adults from several LSS programs, including Step Up Sacramento, the Adolfo program, and Connections, which all serve former foster youth or homeless youth between the ages of 18-24. Classes in Sacramento were scheduled every week for 8 weeks, and the youth committed to going to every class. Michael talked about how much he felt the class impacted LSS clients:

"The series planted seeds to get the language of financial literacy in their minds, and to bridge the gap between having money and knowing what to do with it. The classes got them comfortable with financial terms. They are just so unfamiliar with the language of money, so they didn't really know how to communicate the concerns they had."

LSS is grateful to F&M Bank for teaching this critical information to youth which will have a lifelong, positive influence on their lives. This partnership strives to provide our former foster youth and former homeless youth a foundation to rebuild their lives.
