## Glimmers of Hope By Julie Kennedy

After a whirlwind of visits to meet some of the clients of LSS, I was struck by the strength and hope that courses through their lives. Each with their own story, they are examples of overcoming obstacles that would stop most people in their tracks. Sidelined only temporarily, our clients provide evidence that the partnership of LSS staff with the endurance of our clients is a force to be reckoned with. These are the stories of some of our inspiring clients and how their lives have been changed through the compassionate care they have received from Lutheran Social Services.

## "I've Been Blessed, That's the Bottom Line"

These are the words that Michael says when he talks about no longer being "displaced." At LSS, he has found his home after being homeless for seven years, eleven months, and four days. Long in recovery from drugs and alcohol, Michael was a happily married father of six who owned his own home. Until the day his wife wanted a divorce. That is when he relapsed after fifteen years' sobriety. Michael reports he "ran the streets until he literally could not run any longer." Luckily, two women from Volunteers of America in the Sacramento area asked him if he needed help. He took their hands and the rest, as they say, is history.

When Michael speaks, he does not only speak for himself but for other homeless people. He is an advocate for others who still live the life he escaped. He has experienced firsthand the stereotyping of "the

homeless" and he didn't like it.

"What you see is not always truth. We need to take away that stereotype. When we group people together and label them, we lose individuality. To advocate, you must know who you're advocating for," he says.

He also says that LSS was flexible enough to make the opportunity for him to change his life. Today, he has hope where before he didn't and he loves himself enough to love others.

## **Super Mom**

By all accounts, Terrica is a natural mother. Her motherly instincts are a gift she was born with because they were certainly not modeled for her by her own mother. On her own since she was twelve because of her parent's drug use, Terrica is a single mother of twin daughters. Terrica says that she had to let go of her parent's influences in order to move on. Move on, she did.

With the help of her case manager, Aimee, Terrica reports that LSS has helped her focus on her life. Referred to LSS by a family member, Terrica was not working and her twin daughters were not in preschool when she first arrived to our programs. Since her arrival, she has

skyrocketed. She got a job at Safeway and was quickly promoted from cashier to assistant manager in the deli

department. That was no surprise to LSS staff because, as Aimee reports, "Terrica has a fantastic attitude and everyone loves her." As for Terrica's babies: They are thriving in a Head Start program and Terrica advocates for them the way no one did for her when she was a child.

### Home is Where the Heart is

With a steady voice, Lauren begins to share her story. As she weaves her tale, I begin to notice she remembers intricate details of the countless homes she has lived in - the layout of the house, the color of the paint on the walls. When I ask her how she remembers rich details, she responds it was because she was happy; happy in spite of the traumas she endured.

Lauren's mother was an alcoholic married to an abusive man. Lauren, her older sister, and their mother all suffered at

his hands. They moved all over the country before settling in California when Lauren was thirteen. That was when Lauren was pulled out of school by police who received a report her stepdad was sexually abusing both sisters. Rather than testify against him, Lauren's mother fled the state with her husband, leaving both daughters in foster care..

Lauren became homeless at eighteen. She became a client of LSS and began to turn her life around. Lauren says, "The stability of the program helps me feel safe and the open communication helps me feel like we are family." Finally, Lauren knows what it's like to be part of a family again.
