PROTECT HUD FUNDING IN CA-15

What is HUD and How Does It Help Our Communities?

HUD provides critical housing support through multiple programs:

Housing Choice Vouchers (Section 8) help low-income families afford decent housing Continuum of Care (CoC) grants fund homelessness programs and services HOME and CDBG programs fund affordable housing construction and community development.

CA-15 Housing By the Numbers

Housing Choice Vouchers currently serve:

- 5,203 households through Housing Authority of San Mateo County
- **2,500 households** through San Francisco Housing Authority (CA-15 neighborhoods)
- 222 Emergency Housing Vouchers for vulnerable families in San Mateo County
- Moving to Work program in San Mateo County helping families with 5-year assistance

Combined district total: Over 8,000 households depend on Housing Choice Vouchers

Disaster Recovery and Community Development:

- \$316 million in state and federal funding for San Mateo County housing (2023)
- \$18.5 million in American Rescue Plan Act funds for San Mateo County affordable housing
- \$55.7 million investment from SF Mayor's Office for Sunnydale HOPE SF transformation

Major Affordable Housing Projects:

San Mateo County:

- **Belmont Family Apartments:** 125-unit complex funded by **\$9.5 million** in ARPA funds, 20 units for homeless veterans.
- Half Moon Village: Senior housing with Project-Based Vouchers in Half Moon Bay
- Serenity Senior Apartments: Affordable housing for seniors in East Palo Alto

San Francisco (SE neighborhoods):

- Sunnydale HOPE SF: Complete transformation of 50-acre public housing site into 1,700 mixed-income homes, including 775 public housing replacement units and 200 additional affordable units
- 222 affordable units completed with 75% designated for Sunnydale residents
- The Hub community center serving Sunnydale and Visitacion Valley residents
- \$300,000 Choice Neighborhoods Planning Grant for comprehensive neighborhood transformation



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Time to Take Action!

Housing Crisis Across Our District

San Mateo County:

Average asking rent: \$3,267 per month for 2-bedroom apartment

Income needed to afford rent: \$62.83 per hour (3.6× San Mateo minimum wage) **Federal "low income" definition:** Family of four earning up to \$156,650 annually

San Francisco Neighborhoods (Visitacion Valley, Excelsior, Portola):

Average voucher subsidy needed: \$2,600 per household (nearly doubled since 2014) Voucher recipients are mostly extremely low-income: 87% earn less than 30% AMI Female-headed households: 58% of SF Housing Authority participants

VULNERABLE POPULATIONS ACROSS CA-15:

- Over 25,000 low-income renter households lack access to affordable housing
- 76% of extremely low-income households pay over 50% of income on housing
- 83% of San Mateo voucher recipients earn less than 30% of Area Median Income
- 1,323 beds available for persons experiencing homelessness (far below need)

Who Depends on HUD Assistance:

Typical voucher recipient earns only \$21,412 annually in San Mateo County, while SE San Francisco neighborhoods like Visitacion Valley were historically called "neglected urban backwater" by HUD due to decades of disinvestment.

Threats to HUD Funding

Proposed cuts include:

- 40% reduction in rental assistance funding
- Elimination of traditional Section 8 voucher program
- Two-year time limits for "able-bodied" recipients
- **Block grants** to states with fewer federal protections
- \$700+ million cut from homelessness programs

If funding is reduced:

- Over 18,000 households would lose housing vouchers across CA-15
- \$300+ million in housing development funds at risk
- Critical projects threatened:
 - o 125 affordable units at Belmont Family Apartments could be jeopardized.
 - Sunnydale HOPE SF transformation serving 1,700 families at risk.
 - o 222 Emergency Housing Voucher recipients would face homelessness.
- **Vulnerable populations hit hardest:** 75% of Sunnydale replacement units for current residents, veterans housing, seniors in Half Moon Bay and East Palo Alto

The proposed cuts would be catastrophic: thousands of families could lose their vouchers, the Belmont Family Apartments serving veterans would be at risk, and the Sunnydale HOPE SF project transforming 1,700 homes could be derailed.
