## **Protect Medicaid Funding in Congressional District 11**

Medicaid (**Medi-Cal** in California) provides healthcare for 15+ million Californians. Federal cuts would severely impact healthcare access statewide.

# California's Medi-Cal Funding

Total funding: \$174.6 billion (FY 2024-25)
\$107.5B Federal funding (62%)
\$37.6B State general fund (22%)
\$29.5B Local government, health plan fees, provider taxes (16%) (also under threat of cuts)

# **Direct Impact on San Francisco CA-11**

**Urban healthcare hub at risk:** CA-11 encompasses most of San Francisco, home to world-renowned medical institutions like UCSF Health and Kaiser Permanente that serve the Bay Area and beyond **Diverse urban communities depend on Medi-Cal:** San Francisco's working families, immigrants, seniors, and vulnerable populations rely heavily on Medi-Cal for comprehensive healthcare access **Critical safety-net infrastructure:** San Francisco General Hospital (Zuckerberg SFGH) and community health centers provide essential care to Medi-Cal enrollees and the uninsured throughout the city

**Innovation in healthcare delivery:** San Francisco leads in integrated care models, mental health services, and programs addressing homelessness—all heavily dependent on Medicaid funding

# CA Congressional District 11 Medicaid/Medi-Cal Facts

Total coverage: 175,000 people

This represents 24% of the district's population

An additional **25,000+ residents receive Covered California** premium subsidies Combined, over 200,000 people (**28% of the district**) rely on Medi-Cal or Covered CA subsidies

## Estimated enrollment breakdown:

- 52,500 children (18 and under)
- 35,000 seniors and disabled adults
- 87,500 working adults and caregivers

Economic impact: Approximately \$2.1 billion in annual Medi-Cal spending in the district

## Healthcare infrastructure at risk:

- UCSF Health, consistently ranked among the nation's top 10 hospitals, relies on Medicaid funding for care to vulnerable populations
- San Francisco General Hospital provides critical safety-net services with Medicaid as a major funding source
- Kaiser Permanente San Francisco and community health centers serve substantial Medi-Cal populations
- St. Mary's and Saint Francis hospitals (now part of UCSF Health) provide essential community care

**Potential impact of cuts:** Up to \$1.8 billion in federal funding losses over nine years if cuts are applied proportionally across districts
