Protect Medicaid Funding in Congressional District 19

Medicaid (**Medi-Cal** in California) provides healthcare for 15+ million Californians. Federal cuts would severely impact healthcare access statewide.

California's Medi-Cal Funding

Total funding: \$174.6 billion (FY 2024-25)

\$107.5B Federal funding (62%) \$37.6B State general fund (22%)

\$29.5B Local government, health plan fees, provider taxes (16%) (also under threat of cuts)

Direct Impact on Central Coast CA-19

Diverse coastal and inland communities at risk: CA-19 spans parts of Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, Monterey, and San Luis Obispo counties, with many communities dependent on Medicaid coverage Rural and coastal healthcare facilities threatened: Many hospitals and clinics operate with thin margins and depend on Medicaid reimbursements to stay open in this geographically diverse district Agricultural and tourism workforce vulnerability: Many workers in vineyards, farms, and the hospitality industry throughout the Central Coast rely heavily on Medi-Cal coverage Healthcare access in remote areas: Critical access hospitals serve patients who often travel long distances for care across this expansive coastal and inland district

CA Congressional District 19 Medicaid/Medi-Cal Facts

Total coverage: 230,000 people

This represents 30% of the district's population

An additional 27,000+ residents receive Covered California premium subsidies

Combined, over 257,000 people (33% of the district) rely on Medi-Cal or Covered CA subsidies

Estimated enrollment breakdown:

- 80,000 children (18 and under)
- 45,000 seniors and disabled adults
- 105,000 working adults and caregivers

Economic impact: Approximately \$2.8 billion in annual Medi-Cal spending in the district

Healthcare infrastructure at risk:

- Community hospitals in Santa Cruz, Monterey, and San Luis Obispo counties serve significant Medi-Cal populations
- Community health centers throughout the Central Coast rely heavily on Medicaid funding to serve diverse, multilingual communities
- Long-term care facilities serving the region's senior population depend on Medicaid reimbursements

Current Budget Process

House passed resolution calling for \$880 billion in cuts from Energy & Commerce Both chambers adopted joint budget resolution on April 10, 2025 Committee markups expected in May with final passage targeted **by Memorial Day**
